Over the past five months I have summarised some points from The SA Health *Respectful Behaviour Policy* on team work, staff engagement, constructive feedback, indicators of respectful behaviour and conflict resolution skills. This month, the focus is on “restoring respectful behaviours”.

Restoring respectful behaviours

- An important first step is to work with the team or individual to identify and clarify the problem, seek possible ways forward, and identify the most appropriate strategy to use.
- Refer to key policies, professional frameworks and relevant team vision documents to create a legitimate framework to support the intervention.
- If conflict undermines an intervention process, consider increasing the use of skills from the conflict resolution skill-set.
- Other strategies can include the use of performance review and development processes, creating an effective induction program, and clarifying key objectives for the team.
- Look after your own health: interventions to restore respectful behaviour can be emotionally demanding and stressful. It may be time to increase your own use of healthy coping strategies.
- Watch out for your colleagues' health and wellbeing, and be proactive about supporting those who you think may be managing a difficult situation.

When you think a colleague is being disrespectful

Although each situation is different, the following advice can support your response:

- Respect – be responsive, acknowledge your colleague and communicate respectfully. Establish the intention of the communication to sort things out while maintaining a good working relationship. Listen actively, checking you have understood their perspective accurately.
- Provide information and be open to appropriate discussion.
- Empathy – try to tune into their emotions and use your own wisely. Use ‘I’ statements like: ‘When (objective description of the event) I feel/think/act...’, ‘What I’d like is...’ Be careful not to blame, shame or demand from your colleague.
- Agree to a practical course of action – so that a positive approach can develop. Check your understanding of the action agreed on, and their current level of satisfaction with the action. Agree on a way to monitor satisfaction to ensure the conflict is fully resolved.

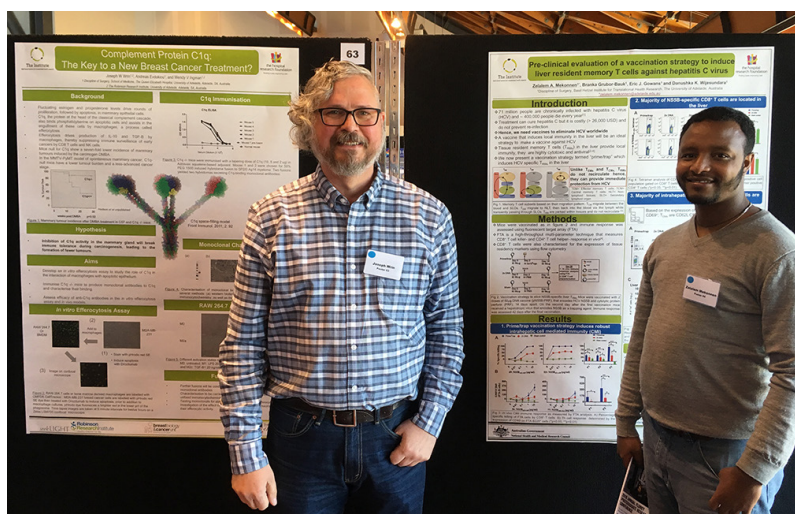

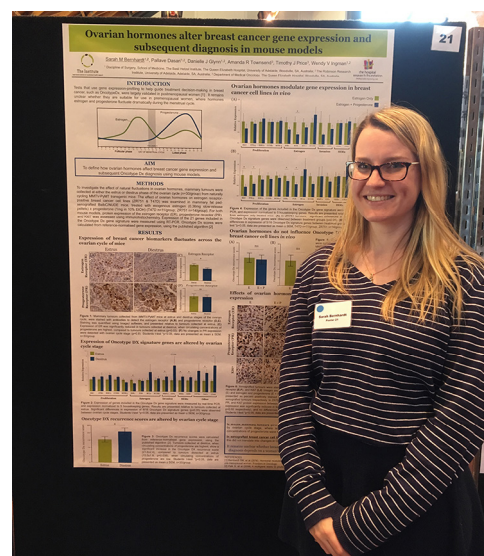

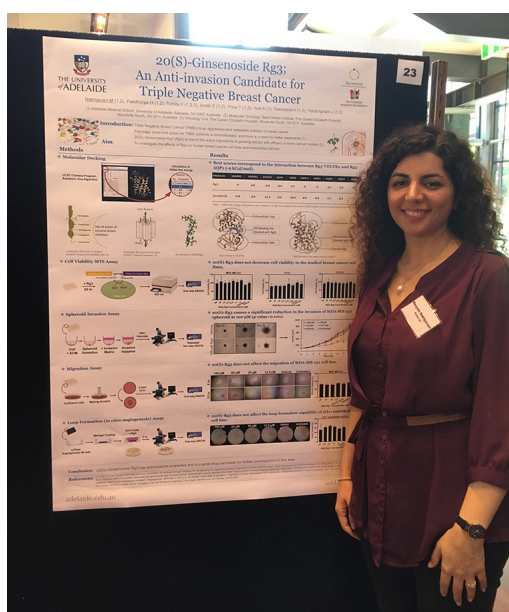

Congratulations to Basil Hetzel Institute PhD students **Zelalem Mekonnen** (Virology Group) and **Sarah Bernhardt** (Breast Biology and Cancer Unit) for being awarded the Research and Business Partnerships Prize (valued at \$200, sponsored by CMAX) and the Adelaide Medical School Prize (valued at \$200) respectively at The University of Adelaide Florey Postgraduate Research Conference.

The conference, held at the National Wine Centre on Tuesday 25 September, showcases the research activity of higher degree research students within the Faculty of Health and Medical Sciences at The University of Adelaide. This year five BHI based students presented their research at the conference, including those shown in the photos together with Dr James Smyth from the Adelaide G-TRAC Centre.

During the afternoon, Sarah also presented her 3MT talk again, as she was one of two Faculty students to make it through to the University wide final on 11 September. Sarah received an award for this achievement too, valued at \$500.

Sarah was asked to provide some comments on the 3MT competition this year. She writes: I would highly recommend all students to take part in the 3MT! As an anxious speaker, participating in the 3MT pushed me out of my comfort zone, and it was a great opportunity to help address my public speaking anxiety, and improve my presentation skills. Additionally, as the 3MT is directed at a non-specialist audience, participation gave me valuable experience in communicating my research to a lay audience, in a way that was comprehensive, engaging, and factual.

While preparing my speech, I was also able to gain a new perspective on my research. It is easy to become too focused on the specifics and details of the project, and to forget about the big picture. By summarising my research in a 3-minute presentation, I could highlight why my research is important, and how it contributes to the bigger picture.

As an added bonus, after making it to the finals, The University of Adelaide organised a communications training workshop, to help finalists develop their skills to become an engaging and confident presenter. These skills were not only useful for the 3MT, but can be used for all future presentations and pitches given.

Overall, I found the 3MT valuable, and would definitely encourage all PhD students to participate next year!

Besides taking care of patients with cardiovascular diseases, she was also passionate about heart rhythm disorders and was actively involved in many electrophysiology procedures including electrophysiological studies, arrhythmia ablations and pacemaker implantations. Linh is currently pursuing her PhD under the supervision of Professor Robert Adams and Dr Isuru Ranasinghe with a project about nation-wide outcomes of catheter ablation for atrial fibrillation – the most commonly encountered arrhythmia in clinical practice.

2019 THRF SCHOLARSHIPS

The Institute (BHI) Policy Committee supports the following four Scholarship categories for 2019.

1. 12 month THRF Postgraduate Research Scholarship

Applications: Open 23 July 2018; close 31 October 2018

Scholarship Value: RTP Stipend rate for 2019 (expected to be in vicinity of \$28,000)

Number offered: Variable, depending on funds available

Eligibility: Open to medical and science students enrolling in 2019 in a research higher degree at a South Australian University and supervised by researcher based at TQEH/BHI. A student can only hold The Hospital Research Foundation Postgraduate Research Scholarship if they do not simultaneously hold another fully funded Postgraduate Research Scholarship

Condition: 70% of work must be conducted at TQEH/BHI. Students reapplying for continuation of Scholarship funding must demonstrate that they have applied in 2019 for external scholarships for 2020. Continued funding is subject to satisfactory academic progress report and available funds.

Selection: When assessing a student's application for The Hospital Research Foundation Postgraduate Research Scholarship the Basil Hetzel Institute (BHI) Scholarship Selection Committee considers academic merit, postgraduate clinical training, where relevant, the quality of the proposed research, the suitability of the intended supervisor and Department, the capacity of the Department to support the student project, suitability of the applicant for research training, publications and highly relevant work experience.

2. NEW Postgraduate Top up Scholarships (Non-Medical degree background)

Applications: Open 23 July 2018; close 31 October 2018; Additional round may be considered

Total Scholarship Value: Up to \$10,000 per year for 3 years (PhD program) or 2 years (Masters)

Number offered: Variable, depending on funds available

Eligibility: Non-medical background graduates enrolling in a higher degree in 2019 at BHI who have been awarded a fully funded external scholarship. Subsequent proof of acceptance of external scholarship and enrolment start date required. Reports from referees who know the student's capacity for training are still required as part of the application submission process. Open to domestic students only.

Condition: 70% of work must be conducted at TQEH/BHI; continued funding is subject to satisfactory academic progress.

3. THRF Honours Research Scholarships

Applications: Open 23 July 2018; close 22 November 2018

Total Scholarship Value: \$8,000 for the year

Number offered: Variable, depending on funds available

Eligibility: Students must be eligible to enrol in an Honours Degree with any University in South Australia. A student can only hold The Hospital Research Foundation Honours Research Scholarship if they do not simultaneously hold another Honours Scholarship.

Condition: 70% of work must be conducted at TQEH/BHI.

4. THRF Vacation Research Scholarships

These Scholarships have been supported in the past by host departments. Vacation Scholarships will now be supported by half funding from THRF, and half funding from the host department.

Applications: Open 23 July 2018; close 11 October 2018

Total Scholarship Value: \$1,600 (\$200pw for maximum of 8 weeks)

Number offered: Up to 15 Scholarships, depending on funds available

Eligibility: The Vacation Research Scholarship is designed for undergraduate students who have completed at least two years of their course. A student can only hold The Hospital Research Foundation Vacation Research Scholarship if they do not simultaneously hold another Vacation scholarship.

Condition: The student will be based in a research group at TQEH/BHI.

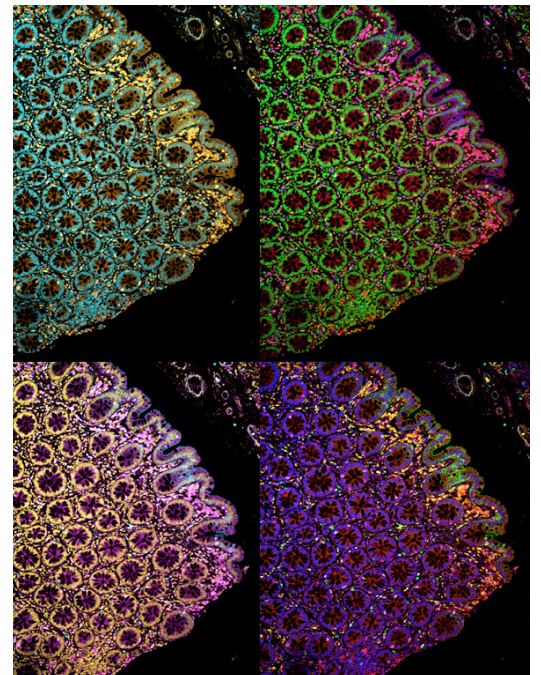

Dr Sarah Appleton's research on Obstructive Sleep Apnoea (OSA) and links with heart disease was reported in [The Advertiser](#) recently. From the article, "Sleep problems cost Australia up to \$66 billion annually, and \$6 billion of this is directed to obstructive sleep apnoea (OSA), a disorder characterised by snoring and repetitive collapse of the upper airway during sleep...Dr Appleton and her team from The Health Observatory, Basil Hetzel Institute and The University of Adelaide, are in the process of determining if a delayed OSA diagnosis and impact of treatment is linked to the development of heart disease and other conditions in Adelaide men... Now, with funding from The Hospital Research Foundation, researchers will be able to follow these men up and repeat the study to determine the characteristics of men who have severe OSA now but had no or only mild OSA five to 10 years ago."

Pre-review service for clinical research grants

All research studies, including grant funded research, require appropriate ethics and governance approvals before they can commence. Unlike the NHMRC, many funding bodies do not utilise a peer-review system as part of their grant funding rounds. This can lead to delays in researchers obtaining the post-award approvals that are required before they can start their projects.

The CALHN Research Office is offering pre-application scientific review of clinical human research projects by the CALHN HREC Chair, Mr Ian Tindall, with a view to facilitating efficient post-award approval processes. Please submit your study protocol/grant application and any information regarding investigational drugs or devices for review as soon as possible and no later than one week prior to the grant submission deadline.

When you think a colleague is being disrespectful (continued)

If strong emotion is present, explore your part in the disrespect or conflict by considering:

- Why am I feeling so annoyed, angry, hurt?
- What do I want to change?
- What do I need in order to let go of this feeling?
- Whose problem is this, really?
- How much is mine?
- How much is the other person's?
- What is the underlying message I infer from the situation?
- How can I work with this constructively?

If you still feel that you have not improved things with your colleague:

- seek advice from your manager or HR team. If your manager is the person with whom you are having difficulty, talk with their line manager or HR team
- access employee assistance, such as the Employee Assistance Program (EAP), and talk with a trained counsellor
- consider increasing your use of healthy coping strategies: good nutrition, physical exercise, family support, relaxation and 'time out'
